Jerusalem and Stewardship

Having recently returned from the Holy Land, I find myself still pondering all that was seen, heard (and yes, even smelled) there. Chief among my impressions was the Temple Mount, dominated by the Muslims (and called *Haram Esh Sharif* or "The Holy Sanctuary"); the entire area considered as a mosque. Then there is the reality of the state of Israel occupying and controlling the entire area surrounding the Temple Mount, and some Jews and Christians who would like to retake that area for a rebuilding of a third temple.

We are all familiar with the raw emotion and violence associated with Israel, Jerusalem and the Temple Mount. No less than three of the major world religions find their origins in and around that area we know as the "Holy Land." While in Jerusalem, I observed that the tension resulting from land that is "holy" to three major world religions conveys a strange holiness. If holiness is separation from the world resulting from communion with God, then the emotional attachment to a place like Temple Mount produces a rather odd holiness, for it is one in which violence and assault against the neighbor has a rather long history.

Let us learn from this reality, and from the Scriptures that remind us that the land we call "holy" belongs, not to us, but to God. As Christians we know that our Lord and "King" did not come to establish a worldly kingdom based upon coercive power or the control of land, money or military might. As Jesus reminded Pilate that, *"My Kingdom is NOT of this world..."* so the Scriptures tell us that the land over which so many fight to control or keep, belongs to God. The question remains: will those who have agendas for the land *"let go and let God?"* I certainly do not know the answer to that question!

But I do know that as Baptized and faith-full people, Christians are (as Leviticus indicates) *"strangers and sojourners"* in THIS time and place on earth where God has placed us. We are –as Hebrews 13:14 states, pilgrims: *For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city that is to come.*

Beloved, let us be reminded that *this world*, nation, land, and city in which our Gracious God has put us and through which He gives so much, is **temporary**. Both the Apostles John and Paul remind us that *"the world is passing away."* (read this in I Corinthians 7:31 and I John 2:17) What we see and value and seek to hold onto and control will ultimately give way to that Kingdom that has no end.

Let us keep this in mind as we –in very anxious and uncertain financial circumstances- begin our Stewardship emphasis for this year. *"The land"* belongs to God! So do our bodies, our time, and all that we have been given (and that we call our "possessions"). The God who loves us in Jesus Christ will keep us from any unnecessary "holding onto" of things belonging to this world, be it land, money, home, relationships or political party. All of life is lived under the cross. This reality of our Baptism enables to live sacrificially, offering *"ourselves, our time and our possessions"* all signs of God's gracious love in and through Jesus Christ, who walked upon the "holy land" but possessed none of it. May God help us to give thanks for and responsibly manage all that He owns and has entrusted to us, and favor our on-going effort to good stewards with His bounty!

Our Constitution states:

- Oversee all board Chairpersons, committees and organizations.
- Act in behalf of the voters between voters meetings in accordance with the directions set by the voters meeting.

Fostering Children Brings Positive Growth

Train a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not turn from it.” - Proverbs 22:6

Fostering a child may seem like an intimidating experience; it is one that requires dedication, compassion and patience. But for parents like Cheryl Mann, seeing the growth and positive change in a child far outweighs the hard work put in.

Many children in foster care come from backgrounds where they experienced neglect or abuse or were otherwise not provided all the necessities to lead happy and productive lives. This was the case for Amy*. Cheryl and her husband Kent welcomed Amy into their home and hearts when she was only ten-months-old. Shortly after placement they began to realize the troubles Amy would have as a child. She was diagnosed early on with failure to thrive and later it was confirmed she also had Asperger Syndrome and Asthma.

The next couple of years proved difficult as Amy’s development would progress and regress. Cheryl utilized all the training she was given prior to her placement and the child continued to grow up healthy but because of her medical conditions she remained introverted and timid. One role a parent of any capacity plays in a child’s life is being able to recognize their strengths and weaknesses so as Amy grew, Cheryl put a heavy focus on the things she could excel at.

“Amy is very shy. Because of that I wanted put her in things where she could flourish and grow and see what she was capable of,” said Cheryl.

Keeping school as an important priority, Cheryl began finding other activities for Amy to participate in. She found that gymnastics and dance resonated especially well with her. Amy focused wholeheartedly on dance, taking ballet, tap and baton. To build her confidence even more and help her break out of her shell, Cheryl sought out venues for Amy to perform in. Recitals and parades led to her biggest performance to date, the Gospel Explosion Showcase, held this past September. The event welcomed performers of all types to give praise to the Lord.

Amy took the stage twice and performed a jazz routine for an audience of over 200, which included family, friends and LFS staff members who came to support her ten years after her initial placement.

“When it comes to fostering a child there is no clear cut way to ensure success. Every child is different and the best foster parents are the ones who take the time to appreciate those differences and help the children in their care thrive in the areas they can,” said Foster Care Case Manager Patty Etheridge. It was Patty who made the first phone call to Cheryl to let her know Amy would be placed in her home and now ten years later, Patty is able to see and appreciate the person Amy is growing into.

Like many foster parents, Cheryl and Kent eventually took the necessary steps to ensure a permanent home for the child they had come to love and legally adopted Amy.
